Adventures in Cartooning. By James Sturm, Andrew Arnold and Alexis Frederick-Frost. Illus. by the authors. First Second.

The Magic Cartooning Elf mesmerizes readers with the story of a knight and a princess that also provides step-by-step instruction for creating cartoons.

An Eye for Color: The Story of Josef Albers. By Natasha Wing. Illus. by Julia Breckenreid. Holt.

In a picture book format, Wing offers simple explanations of the unusual ways that artist Josef Albers used color and shape to open the eyes of the world.

Anne Frank: Her life in words and pictures from the archives of The Anne Frank House. By Menno Metselaar and Ruud van der Rol.

A visual companion to other accounts of Anne Frank's life is told chiefly through photographs, many published nowhere else, and handwritten excerpts from her actual diary in a well-researched and powerful and compact package.

Bad News for Outlaws: The Remarkable Life of Bass Reeves, Deputy U.S. Marshal. By Vaunda Micheaux Nelson. Illus. by R. Gregory Christie. Carolrhoda.

Former slave Bass Reeves, the first black U.S. Marshall, staunchly defended territorial law in the American West through many remarkable deeds. (The 2010 Coretta Scott King Author Award Winner)

Crow Call. By Lois Lowry. Illus. by Bagram Ibatoulline.

Reunited after serving in the war, a father and youngest daughter begin their journey of reconnection through a hunting shirt, cherry pie, tender conversation, and a crow call.

The Day-Glo Brothers: The True Story of Bob and Joe Switzer's Bright Ideas and Brand-New Colors. By Chris Barton. Illus. by Tony Persiani. Charlesbridge.

This glowing biography tells of two inventive brothers who worked together from a startling discovery in their basement to a lifetime creating fluorescent colors. (A 2010 Sibert Honor Book.)

Diego: Bigger Than Life. By Carmen T. Bernier-Grand. Illus. by David Diaz.

A series of chronological poems delve into the life of artist Diego Rivera, enlivened by bold, bigger than life images. (A 2010 Belpré Illustrator Honor Book and Belpré Author Honor Book.)

Down, Down, Down: A Journey to the Bottom of the Sea. By Steve Jenkins. Illus. by the author. Houghton.

This irresistible underwater exploration reveals the mysteries of the sea by going deeper and deeper and deeper from top to bottom, viewing little known creatures and encountering spaces where few have ever been.

The Grand Mosque of Paris: A Story of How Muslims Rescued Jews During the Holocaust. By Karen Gray Ruelle and Deborah Durland DeSaix. Illus. by the authors. Powerful illustrations illuminate a little known aspect of WWII resistance: the heroic Muslim effort to orchestrate the escape of Jews who were aggressively pursued by Nazis during the four-year occupation of Paris.

River of Dreams: The Story of the Hudson River. By Hudson Talbott. Illus. by the author.

With illustrations that flow along with the text, this book celebrates the river that has played a key role in the settling of the New World, the outcome of the Revolutionary War, and the history of a state and a country.

Eidi. By Bodil Bredsdorff. Trans. by Kathryn Mahaffy.

Feeling displaced by the birth of her half-brother, Eidi leaves her beloved family in Crow Cove and sets out on a journey to discover her independence and talents. (A 2010 Batchelder Honor Book.)

The Evolution of Calpurnia Tate. By Jacqueline Kelly. Holt.

Eleven-year-old Calpurnia Virginia Tate and her curmudgeony old grandfather bond over their interest in the evolution of the species on a Texas plantation at the turn of the last century. (A 2010 Newbery Honor Book.)

A Faraway Island. By Annika Thor. Trans by Linda Schenck. Delacorte.

Two Jewish sisters from Vienna, Austria, are sent by their parents to Sweden to escape the Nazis. (The 2010 Batchelder Award Book.)

Federico García Lorca. By Georgina Lázaro. Illus. by Enrique S. Moreiro.

Lázaro's lyrical poetry, written in Spanish, evokes the spirit and style of 20th-century poet and playwright, Federico García Lorca. (A 2010 Belpré Author Honor Book.)

The Frog Scientist. By Pamela S. Turner. Photographs by Andy Comins.

Tyrone Hayes and his students work to understand frogs so they can save these amphibians from the pesticides that are slowly killing off creatures older than dinosaurs.

How Oliver Olson Changed the World. By Claudia Mills. Illus. by Heather Maione. Farrar.

A third-grade science project gives Oliver the confidence to break free from his overprotective parents in this humorous, realistic school story.

In the Belly of an Ox: the Unexpected Photographic Adventures of Richard and Cherry Kearton. By Rebecca Bond. Illus. by the author.

Establishing a new era in nature photography, two brothers spend many weekends finding ingenious ways to photograph bird nests in the nineteenth century English countryside.

The Magician's Elephant. By Kate DiCamillo. Illus. by Yoko Tanaka.
A fortune teller's strange prediction and a magician's startling trick lead Peter on an extraordinary journey to find his sister in the kingdom of Baltese.

The Mostly True Adventures of Homer P. Figg. By Rodman Philbrick. Blue Sky.
Homer, an admitted liar and teller of tales, must rescue his brother Harold after Uncle Squinton Leach sells him to the Union Army. (A 2010 Newbery Honor Book.)

Pharaoh's Boat. By David L. Weitzman. Illus. by the author.
Meticulously created, hieroglyphic-like illustrations along with a detailed text reveal the riddle of reconstructing a regal boat commissioned by Cheops, the Pharaoh, to journey into the afterlife.

The Small Adventure of Popeye and Elvis. By Barbara O'Connor.
Popeye grabs at a chance for adventure and friendship when a boy his age named Elvis rolls into the sleepy town of Fayette.

The Storm in the Barn. By Matt Phelan. Illus. by the author. Candlewick.
At the stark, dry height of the 1937 Kansas dust bowl, 11-year-old Jack tries to bring back the rain when he challenges a mythical figure in this stirring graphic novel.

Tsunami! By Kimiko Kajikawa. Illus. by Ed Young. Philomel.
Through deep personal sacrifice, Ojiisan, known as grandfather, saves his village from a tsunami. The tension in this Japanese folktale is heightened by the rich texture of the mixed media illustrations.

When You Reach Me. By Rebecca Stead. Random/Wendy Lamb.
Twelve-year-old Miranda must unravel a puzzle involving increasingly strange notes warning that someone she knows may die. (The 2010 Newbery Award Winner.)

Where the Mountain Meets the Moon. By Grace Lin. Illus. by the author. Little, Brown.
A young Chinese girl, long a believer in her father's fantastic stories, goes on a quest to find the legendary Old Man of the Moon in the hope of bringing life to Fruitless Mountain. (A 2010 Newbery Honor Book.)

A Whiff of Pine, A Hint of Skunk: A Forest of Poems. By Deborah Ruddell. Illus. by Joan Rankin. Simon & Schuster/Margaret K. McElderry.
Clever rhyming verse showcases a variety of forest animals throughout the seasons.

You Never Heard of Sandy Koufax?! By Jonah Winter. Illus. by André Carrilho. Random/Schwartz & Wade.
Sandy Koufax's achievements as a great left-handed pitcher come to life in dramatic and dynamic illustrations coupled with smitherings of alluring facts and figures.

Kelly, Jacqueline. *The Evolution of Calpurnia Tate*. Henry Holt. 2009.

In 1899, eleven-year-old Calpurnia bonds with her grandfather over science and nature even as she becomes increasingly aware that she may not be able to pursue those interests as an adult.

King, A.S. *The Dust of 100 Dogs*. Llewellyn Publications/Flux. 2009.

After being cursed to live the lives of 100 dogs before being reborn as a human, former pirate Emer Morrisey returns to Jamaica to reclaim treasure buried centuries before.

LaCour, Nina. *Hold Still*. Dutton. 2009.

Devastated by her best friend's suicide, Caitlin tries to rebuild her own life and relationships while finding the courage to read the journal that Ingrid left behind.

Larbalestier, Justine. *Liar*. Bloomsbury. 2009.

For years Micah has been a liar, and after her boyfriend's brutal murder, will anyone...will you... believe what she has to say?

Levine, Kristine. *The Best Bad Luck I Ever Had*. Penguin/G.P. Putnam's Sons. 2009.

1917 Alabama, 12-year-old Dit's life in rural Moundville becomes complicated and tragic by his friendship with Emma, the African American daughter of the new postman.

Lockhart, E. *The Treasure Map of Boys*. Noel, Jackson, Finn, Hutch--And Me, Ruby Oliver. Random House/Delacorte Press. 2009.

Ruby Oliver's neurotic mind continues to struggle with having boys as friends while being backstabbed by her female classmates at Seattle's Tate Prep School.

Madigan, L.K. *Flash Burnout*. Houghton Mifflin. 2009. Blake Hewson discovers there's a big difference between lust and love, a tough lesson for a fifteen-year-old involved with a girlfriend and another girl as a friend.

Magoon, Kekla. *The Rock and the River*. Aladdin. 2009. In 1968 Chicago, Sam struggles to decide whether to support his father's nonviolent approach to civil rights or his brother, who has joined the Black Panther Party.

McCormick, Patricia. *Purple Heart*. HarperCollins Publisher/Balzer + Bray. 2009. Private Matt Duffy receives the Purple Heart, but he cannot remember the incident that left him with a traumatic brain injury and an image of an Iraqi boy's death.

McKernan, Victoria. *The Devil's Paintbox*. Random House/Knopf. 2009. Orphaned siblings Aiden and Maddy have survived Kansas, barely, setting out on the Oregon Trail just to have regular meals. But the trip is more than they expected...

McKinley, Robin and Peter Dickinson. *Fire: Tales of Elemental Spirits*. GP Putnam's Sons/ Penguin Young Readers Group. 2009. Fire in different and subtle interpretations: a phoenix hatched from an egg forgotten in an old museum, a dragon that can't go into Firespace, a hellhound/dog that finds a family.

Miller-Lachmann, Lyn. *Gringolandia*. Curbstone Press. 2009. After surviving years of torture as a political prisoner in Chile in the 1980s, Daniel's father rejoins his family in the United States, but his fight for justice isn't over.

Napoli, Donna Jo. *Alligator Bayou*. Random House / Knopf. 2009. Fourteen-year-old Calogero emigrates to Louisiana in 1899, where his tiny Sicilian community faces discrimination and worse in a small town where they're considered neither black nor white.

Northrop, Michael. *Gentlemen*. Scholastic. 2009. After one of four rough-cut high school guys disappears, his friends become suspicious of their teacher, Mr. Haberman, who refers to them as gentlemen while teaching Crime and Punishment.

Oaks, J. Adams. *Why I Fight*. Atheneum/Richard Jackson Books. 2009. For five years, Wyatt travels the country with his drifter Uncle Spade, first as a companion, then as a money-making bare-fisted fighter, until realizing Spade doesn't exactly have Wyatt's best interests at heart.

Pearson, Mary E. *The Miles Between*. Henry Holt. 2009. October 19th never turns out well, but this year is different as Destiny takes off on a road trip with three classmates in a convertible left by a mysterious stranger.

Rapp, Adam. *Punkzilla*. Candlewick Press. 2009.

Jamie has run away from his family, military school, and his troubled past. He sets out via bus to visit his dying brother, writing letters along the way.

Runyon, Brent. *Surface Tension: A Novel in Four Summers*. Random House/Alfred A. Knopf. 2009. Every summer Luke spends two weeks vacationing at a lake, and every year things are just slightly different.

Ryan, Carrie. *The Forest of Hands and Teeth*. Random House/Delacorte. 2009. Mary's village is protected by a fence keeping out the Unconsecrated (who are undead craving human flesh) until a massive breach launches the teenage girl into a fight for survival.

Scott, Elizabeth. *Love You, Hate You, Miss You*. HarperCollins/HarperTeen. 2009. Seventy-five days after the car crash that killed her best friend Julia, Amy leaves rehab and begins writing a series of letters to her in a journal.

Smith, Andrew. *In the Path of Falling Objects*. Macmillan/Feiwel and Friends. 2009. When their mother abandons them, brothers Jonah and Simon hit the road and make one fatal mistake: they accept a ride from a pretty girl and a dangerous man.

Smith, Sherri L. *Flygirl*. Penguin/G.P. Putnam's Sons. 2009. During WWII, Ida Mae Jones must go against her family and heritage to join the Army's WASP program and fulfill her dream of being a pilot.

Standiford, Natalie. *How to Say Goodbye in Robot*. Scholastic. 2009. Fringe dwellers Jonas (Ghost Boy) and Beatrice (Robot Girl) use their adopted alter egos to help navigate the difficulties of fractured families and impending adulthood during their senior year.

Stead, Rebecca. *When You Reach Me*. Random House / Wendy Lamb Books. 2009. The year they are twelve, Sal begins to ignore Miranda and breaks her heart.
